- Explain the difference between a captain of industry and a robber baron.

- Support your conclusion with three well-explained facts about the individual.

2. Pretend you are an immigrant in the early 1900s who is living in lower Manhattan. Tell us your story.

- What were the reasons for leaving your country?
- Why did you choose to come to the United States instead of other countries?
- What is life like for you in the big city? (For this part be sure to discuss some of the problems and issues with urbanization.)

3. World War I, originally known as the Great War, was something people had never experienced before. In what ways was the war different from earlier wars? THINK ABOUT:
